




# Letter from the Vicar

Dear friends,

The various events we run at St John's – socials, meals, cream teas, pub quizzes, and our bigger fayres – are such a joy and one of the real strengths of this



ministry, but even more importantly, they build us into a true community. We are not simply worshippers who gather on Sundays and go our separate ways; we are friends who share time, laughter, and food together.

These occasions also help us reach out beyond our congregation. Many people first encounter St John's through our events, and they often discover here a

warm, welcoming community they want to be part of. In that sense, our social life is not just enjoyable – it is a vital part of our mission. Long may we continue to offer easy, friendly ways for

people to get to know us.

But to keep this going, we do need help. You may know there is an Events Committee, but please don't imagine this means there are plenty of people to do everything. In fact, numbers have shrunk, and many of those who remain also carry heavy responsibilities elsewhere in church life. The Committee's role is to plan and coordinate our events, but it is simply not possible for the same small group to also do all the baking, advertising, setting-up, washing-up, and clearing away.





That's where you come in. We usually have sign-up sheets for each event, and while these help a little, we have recently found we have needed to approach people for help because not enough have signed the sheets. Even an hour here or there offering some kind of help makes a huge difference. So my **first plea** is this: if you've been hesitant to volunteer — perhaps thinking you're not needed or you can't do much — please know that every contribution matters. An hour washing up or putting out chairs can mean the difference between a tired Committee and a flourishing community.



time, which is fine.

And if you're newer to St John's, don't wait before getting involved. You don't have to 'serve time' before you can join in — we'd love to have you pitch in straight away.

My **second plea** is that some of you might consider joining the Events Committee itself. This doesn't mean taking on everything – far from it! – but simply helping with planning, sharing ideas, and perhaps taking responsibility for a small part of an event now and again. The Committee meets just a few times a year, usually for an hour, on a Tuesday or a Wednesday evening, and not everyone can attend every

For those who don't wish to join the Committee but are willing to be asked occasionally for help, we are creating a new sign-up list. By putting your name down you are not committing to anything other than being open to being asked – and of course you can always say no if it's not possible.

If you've sometimes felt on the edge of church life and wondered how to get more involved, this could be a simple way forward. Please don't underestimate what you can offer. Even a small task, done alongside others,

helps build our life together – and you may well find that you enjoy it and make new friends along the way.



The general sign-up sheet will be available in church throughout October and November. And if, for whatever reason, you are not in a position to help in this way, please don't feel guilty. We understand that you may wish to but may not be able to at this juncture and season. Your presence and your prayers are still a gift to us all.

Finally, a heartfelt thank you to those who already give so

much of their

time and energy to our social life. For their sake, let's try to share the load. I believe these events are not just enjoyable extras, but essential to the health and future of St John's – for building one another up in love and

friendship and for reaching out to the wider community with love and joy. I'm



thrilled that St John's has developed a reputation for being such a lively, social and welcoming church.

# Poole-Wau Partnership (PWP)



It was great to welcome Mark Rathbone last month to St John's, who told us in both our services about the Poole-Wau Partnership. For those who were not here, this is part of Salisbury Diocese's link with Sudan and South Sudan. South Sudan comes out as the poorest nation in the world, bar Somalia, in terms of economy, health, age expectancy and so forth. Each deanery in Salisbury Diocese is encouraged to partner with an area in that region, and the Poole-Wau Partnership is the Poole and North Bournemouth Deanery's commitment to support (which is our deanery).

It is time for St John's to also engage with this project, and I know Mark was greatly touched by your interest and financial giving when he came. We will definitely invite him back next year to tell us more about what is going on in the partnership! Thank you for supporting the work they do so marvellously. In a new departure for the PWP, the teaching course, which the team delivered when they visited Wau in February, went down so well that they are offering a scaled down version of it locally. A shortened version of it, just one day, will take place at St Michael's Church in Hamworthy on Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> October, 10am for a 10.30am start, and ending around 3pm. A light lunch will be provided. The day will include a presentation about the recent visit, but also will cover three themes: St Luke and his Gospel, the Role of Women in the Church, and Salvation. You will be able to find contact details for booking onto this from the above website. The event is free, but donations are welcome. We look forward to being part of the ongoing relationship and support for PWP!

#### Fairtrade, St John's and me!

My story: It was a long time ago – about 1975! A friend told me about the new initiative that had been started by a group of Christians. It was called 'Fairtrade'. Up to that point I had never considered the people who grew the bananas that my little boy liked so much, the cocoa and sugar for our much-enjoyed chocolate, coffee my go-to drink (still is!). But she opened my eyes. Growers



were living on a pittance (many still do). They couldn't afford basic essentials let alone health care or education for their children, all of which I, though not well off, happily took for granted.

So, after much thought and prayer, I bought into Fairtrade and signed up as a Fairtrader with Traidcraft, a Fairtrade company in my local church. Fairtraders are volunteers who sell on Fairtrade products and promote fairtrade. For a number of years I was also a Fairtrade speaker and gave a number of presentations to various groups. I particularly enjoyed talking at schools, where the audience could be quite challenging but never not interested.

Fairtrade guarantees a fair and sustained price for the produce, and gives growers the chance of a decent standard of living. Fairtrade developed over the years, and introduced a 'Fairtrade Premium', available to local communities to spend according to their needs. This still applies today and makes





I was pleased when Fairtrade was introduced at St John's, and that it was well supported. When Jenny, who had run a regular Fairtrade stall for some time decided to stand down (due to her undertaking other roles in church) I was very happy to take over as St John's Fairtrade rep. In 2023 the PCC took the decision for St John's to become a Fairtrade Church, committing the church to carry on supporting Fairtrade – the certificate is on the table by the church door.

Unfortunately Traidcraft, my Fairtrade 'home', went into administration in 2022. However I decided to try and continue and now have to cast my net wider to find the goods. Luckily I have managed to do so, and try to keep a well-stocked and varied stall. Chocolate, biscuits and cards are particularly popular, but I try to ring the changes.

I can't believe I am thinking about Christmas already - but I have brochures and order forms for Christmas cards and wrapping paper from Transform Trade - profits from these enable the Fairtrade Premiums to continue. Order early to be sure your chosen cards



are still in stock (no postage required as long as I get enough orders!). As with other goods I ask for payment on receipt of your goods. I also have a small stock of Christmas cards at reduced prices. And hopefully I can get hold of Fairtrade Advent Calendars (these would need to be ordered).

I am grateful to all the members of St John's congregation who visit the stall regularly (usually held on the second Sunday of each month), and invite everyone to take a peep.

Lastly a plea – PLEASE keep supporting Fairtrade (at church and in the shops) wherever possible – it makes an enormous difference to those who grow and produce the goods we enjoy – not forgetting 'Fair Ground', the Fairtrade shop in the Cornmarket, Wimborne which stocks a wide range of Fairtrade products.

# Exploring "your SHAPE for God's Service"

#### Do you wish

- You could discover your gifts?

St John's Church will be running a short course where you can explore what it means to be a disciple, discover your particular gifts (your SHAPE), and then learn how to use them in His service.

#### What is your SHAPE?

Our lives, experiences, gifts, and talents are all of use to God as He seeks to build His Kingdom, meaning we all have something to offer, even when we don't know it. What is your SHAPE?

**S**piritual Gifts: God's unique gifts to us as members of Christ's Body.

Heart's desire: what motivates and excites us; what we most long to do.

Abilities: our strengths, knowledge and skills.

Personality: our character, style, preferences, and personal qualities.

**E**xperiences: our life experiences and what we have learned from them.

#### When and how?

Through just three 2-hour informal meetings, we will explore what it means to be a disciple, identify our own gifts and talents, discover what inspires us, and ultimately, learn how to use them in God's service.

Following these sessions, you will also receive a (totally optional and confidential) invitation to meet and discuss any topics that the course has raised that you would like to explore.

We are hoping to run the course in early 2026, with dates to be confirmed soon.

If you'd like to discuss this before committing, I would be pleased to meet with you or simply look out for the sign-up sheets. I look forward to exploring together as we SHAPE our lives for God.
